Fishing Report

So far it's been an unusual year for fishing in the Smokies. First it's been very dry and the water levels for the most part have been low. Then in March the weather changed from Winter to Summer almost overnight. The water temperatures rose and the early aquatic insects started hatching. Nature has had a tough time sticking with tradition. The Quill Gordons and Blue Quills began their Spring hatch and the fishing was good but not great. It was so warm that the better fishing was early and late which is normal in the Summer but not in March. Some other insects such as Yellow Sallies. March Browns and Hendricksons started hatching early. With the water still low the fish were concentrated and not in their usual Spring locations. They were spooky. Now, it's the first week of April and we're back into winter again with lows in the 20's and highs in the 40's. The fishing will slow down.

This is a year I won't forget. By the time you read this we should be warming up and fishing in the Smokies will be excellent soon but when I don't know. It's mostly driven by temperature. We should see a lot of different insects hatching including my favorite the Yellow Sally. I like to be on the Middle Prong of the Little River a couple of hours before dark and be soothed by the sound of the stream and hatch these bright insects being slurped down by trout. I'll be

fishing Lynn Camp Prong a lot this year. →
It's my favorite stream in the Park except for
the Middle Prong which Lynn Camp and
Thunderhead form. I like to fish above the
cascade and upstream about two miles. I
never catch a Brown Trout there. Steve
Moore who is in charge of the Fisheries
Department at the Park says there were not
stocked and they can't make it above the
cascade. So, what you have is thousands of
fish per mile and they are mostly rainbows
with an occasional brookie.

There have been some huge stocked rainbows caught in the Little River here in Townsend. I guess they released some brood fish last fall but I've seen pictures and even a corpse or two of trout in the 24" to 25" range. One kid caught his first trout, on his first cast and it was 25" long. So much for paying your dues. To me, the next couple of months are the best for fishing in the Smokies. I'm looking forward to that and I'm sure you are too. I'll see you at the April meeting and thanks for supporting the Little River Chapter of Trout Unlimited.

Maps! Maps! Maps!

If you are like me and have been looking for a new place to fish or somewhere you have not been in a while, the first thing I start looking for is a map. Lately I have been going online. I have came across what I think is the best of the online map services. And the most important thing to me is It's free. **ACME Mapper 2.0** (http://mapper.acme.com) is a high-precision general purpose mapping application, based on Google maps with a bunch of things added on. The reason I like it is because it has several formats. You can use it to get different views of the area you are going to. First there is "Maps" which is similar to a Street map. Next is "Satellite" which is just like the name satellite pictures taken from Google maps. "Hybrid" is a streets overlay on top of satellite pictures. "Topo maps" which are the most important to us. They are the USGS maps that we use to buy, but now they have been put online. One reason I like using it so much is that you can zoom in and out to different levels. By doing this you can get greater contour details them you can zoom out to get a road and tails access. Print them on Waterproof Paper and you can make a nice set of maps of the area you are going to. You can purchase Waterproof Paper at Office Depot or Office Max. I will also put a link on the Newsletter webpage for (http://www.waterproofpaper.com) an online store that sales waterproof-paper and also has a watertight map case for \$14.99 plus shipping. →

They also sell an inexpensive waterproof camera bag worth looking into.

Next there are the 'DOQ satellite pictures". They are black and white and not as good as the Google satellite pictures but I think they print better on a laserjet printer. Then there is "NEXRAD" which is similar to the Hybrid. Below are some map coordinates to some of my favorite places to spent a day. Copy and place them in the ACME Mapper find box then zoom out. March Brown Breakout Emerger

Hook: Mustad C49S #12, **Thread:** Brown **Tail:** Brown Hun. Partridge, **Rib:** Dark Brown embroidery Floss or Rod Wrapping Thread, **Abdomen:** Grey-Tan Dubbing, **Wing:** Short

clump of Beaver fur Wingcase:

Appropriately colored (tannish) synthetic dubbing with long fibers, twisted to form a rope and tied in like a wingcase. This imitates the dun "breaking-out" of the nymphal shuck. **Thorax:** Same as abdomen; picked-out at the sides

Legs: Brown Hun. Partridge-wrapped as a collar to imitate legs and wing veination.
