Habera Provides Good TWRA Update LRCTU General Meeting March 27

Jim Habera, TWRA Programs Manager over Region IV, gave a thorough breakdown and stream preview of wild and stocked fished rivers in 21 counties east of Tennessee's plateau that make up this region. This region comprises one of the most diverse and plentiful trout fishing waters in the country. It contains stocked streams, tailwaters, wild streams and reservoirs that provide habitat for trout

Of the 625 miles of wild trout water, Doe Creek, located outside Mountain City, TN, promises some of the best wild rainbow trout prospects in the region, Habera said. If you're hunting brown trout, then Laurel Fork, in Carter County, is a good place to start looking, he noted.



There are 103 designated brook trout

streams in Region IV, that together make up approximately 142 miles of habitable water for the species. For the best brook trout fishing in Tennessee, Habera suggested the Left Prong of Hampton Creek, located in Hampton Creek Cove Scenic Recreational Area near Roane Mountain State Park. <u>http://www.state.tn.us/environment/naturalareas/natural-areas/hampton/</u>

A brand new state park, Rocky Fork State Park, located approximately 30 miles southwest of Johnson City, is being developed and will contain maintained trails and trout waters, Habera noted.

Regarding tailwaters, Habera said TWRA will release more than 630,000 trout annually into the six stocked streams below dams in this region. He noted that enforced slot limits were helping to keep larger fish in the streams for more anglers to enjoy catching.

If you're into lake trout and you can gauge the depth they happen to be feeding at, it's a fun trip Habera said. Fort Patric Henry Reservoir, near Boone has produced record brown trout, he said. Of the 7 trout habitable reservoirs in the state, Habera suggested trying the South Holston Reservoir for plentiful lake trout.



Jim has B.S. (1984) and M.S. (1986) degrees from UT Knoxville and did his graduate work on brook and rainbow trout in Great Smoky Mountains National Park (GSMNP). He was the Research Associate for the TWRA-sponsored Wild Trout Project at UT Knoxville during the 1990s and came to TWRA in 1998 to continue that work.

As added information to his program, Habera sent a follow up photo of what has been informally named Tiger Trout which appears to be a hybrid of

a couple of indigenous trout species here.

Here's the photo of the tiger trout I mentioned (but couldn't find) at the meeting last week. This fish was captured in Deep Gap Creek in the Sundquist State Forest (Cocke Co.) in 2012. We brought it back to our lab where our technician (Carl Williams), who does some high-quality photography, got this image.
