Fishing Picks

August has been a decent month to fish depending on where you are. TVA has started to draw down reservoirs so flows on the tailwaters have started to pick up. Nowhere is this more noticeable than the Clinch. Currently there is still a good window to fish near Clinton in the mornings before the water rises. Recreational flows still allow wading on the weekends. The South Holston and Watauga still have flows to accommodate wading and the fishing continues to be good. The Hiwassee fishes best from a boat when flows are high, but pontoons can get you to some spots where you can wade. Right now the best fishing is between the powerhouse and Big Bend.

The mountains have received rain almost every day so water conditions are great in spite of the heat in Knoxville. You'll need to gain some elevation to find happy fish, but there are plenty of them. Waders are out of the question if you want to stay cool, but this allows for some great fishing in the back country since you can travel light. Hike a few miles upstream of Elkmont for some great fishing on Little River. This is one of the most popular hike-in fishing spots but there are plenty of others.

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Over on the Carolina side of the park you might try Bradley Fork above Smokemont or Deep Creek a few miles upstream of the campground. These are all relatively large streams with great populations of nice trout. In the Cherokee National Forest you should try North and South Forks of Citico Creek, Sycamore Creek, or Bald River upstream of Holly Flats. These are smaller streams, but they all have a ton of greedy fish that see only a few fishermen. Be sure to pack a rain jacket. More than likely you'll need it.

New Water Proof Camera

Using a Digital Camera for a few years now, I have been hesitant about taking it on the stream with me, knowing that if I dropped the camera it was ruined. The other day I came across an advertisement for a new 5 mega pix water proof camera from Pentax, the Optio WP Waterproof Digital Camera.

Features

5 MP CCD captures enough detail for photo-quality 13 x 17-inch prints.

Waterproof body enables approximately 30 minutes of continuous underwater shooting at a depth of up to 1.5 meters.

3x optical zoom; recovery function makes it possible to reclaim images and audio files erased accidentally.

Large, 2.0-inch LCD monitor with lowreflection technology and a backlighting system.

And is powered by a long-life rechargeable Lithium-ion battery; stores images on SD memory cards and has approximately 10.5MB of built-in memory

Prices start at the \$250 range on line. I have not had a chance to get my hands on one yet but it looks like something that would be worth looking into. Anyway it would be cool to be able to stick the camera underwater and click off a few pictures while reeling in your next fish.

Fly of the Month Tan - Sadge (Caddis)

Hook: sizes 14-18.
Thread: Tan 3/0, flat.
Rib: Gold wire, fine.
Hackle: Red, brown.
Body: Tan Superfine.
Wing: Golden pheasant tail fibers trimmed to caddis wing shape.
Hackle: Reddish brown.





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
