On-Stream Report by Kris Maurer

I can't wait until the spring hatches start in the Smokies. I'm really excited about getting up for the Quill Gordon Hatch, which may be here earlier than we think. So far this year we've had to deal with high water and of lately a very brisk cold snap and snow. Although we haven't been able to fish too much, this may prove to help our water conditions out for the year to come.

On January 29th Brett Romer, Doug Moore and myself managed to get up to the South Holston for a little wade fishing. On the way up we stopped by the Fly Shop of Tennessee to talk to Eddie and see how the fishing had been. While there I met Todd the inventor of Todd's Wiggle Minnow. We talked about his fly a little, how and why he designed it. He was great to talk to and it is always interesting to talk to the designer of a fly and get a little insight on things. That fly has produced some great smallmouth and browns for myself and others in the last few years, kudos to Todd.



By the time we got out of the fly shop it was almost noon. We fished up near the weir dam and tried out one of Brett's regular spots. I started with a #14 CDC Comparadun Sulphur w/ a Split Back Sulphur dropper in some riffles and picked up fish fairly consistently. Later in the afternoon Brett and Doug were sight casting to the risers with a #20 Deer Hair Comparadun BWO and were catching fish way too easily. It was obvious that there were just a few BWO's emerging and the fish were looking for them. The big fish of the day was a 16 inch rainbow that was surprisingly enough caught on the big Sulphur dry, but we



landed some decent numbers and it is always great to get on the water with friends.

We should continue to see more BWO's hatching on both the South Holston and Watauga, make sure to have both emerger patterns and adults. My favorites are the Phase II BWO Emerger, CDC and Deer Hair Comparaduns, as well as small Quasimodo Pheasant Tails and Split Back BWO nymphs.
