HIGH WATER A CHALLENGE FOR YOUNG BROOK TROUT



We had a great Chapter meeting last month. Matt Kulp (GSMNP Fisheries Biologist) did a masterful job of explaining (via data) why Lynn Camp Prong will continue to be close to fishing at least through this year. I could never explain it as well as Matt did, but major floods over the past couple of winters have devastated the young brookies, lowering overall populations to levels that cannot support fishing pressure. Matt also talked about how brook trout genetic studies will be an important tool in ensuring the long term survival of the species.

While there continues to be successful brook trout restoration programs in the Park and in other parts of the country, scientists are now beginning to understand how important connectivity between different populations is to their long-term survival. If given the opportunity, different brook trout populations will share genes (over long periods of time) enabling the species to develop the greatest evolutionary potential needed to handle future environmental threats. Without this sharing of genes, isolated populations may not be able to overcome these environmental changes. Interesting stuff!

I have truly been blessed throughout my career, a career that started with God placing a country boy from western North Carolina in his dream job. My career has been filled with learning and hard work and many of you were by my side many times. We have gathered scientific data that has helped guide our fisheries program, collected water quality data that is being used to guide research related to acid deposition issues. All of this has led to an outstanding partnership that has been recognized nationally within the National Park Service and TU. A partnership based on trust and mutual respect. But for me the friendships that have developed will last a lifetime."

Get on Board for a Chapter Fishing Outing This Year!

This year we have four trips planned. The first will be to Cataloochee River on March 21 and 22. The club has reserved group site 1 at the Cataloochee campgrounds. In the group campsite, we have room for 25 people with 5 vehicles so we will have to buddy up for the trip to the valley. This is a tent only site. If members wish to take a camper vehicle, please make your own reservation for an appropriate site. This is a rich historical area and should make for an interesting trip.

Second planned trip is to the Oconaluftee River. The club will be staying at the Smokemont campground. The date for this trip has not been selected yet but will be after Labor Day. When the date is selected, it will be in the news letter and at the club meetings.

Third trip is to Twenty Mile Creek. This creek has the distinction of being the most remote creek that can be reached by car. Two options are available for this trip. It can be done as a day trip or a back country camping trip. A fall trip is planned for this trip to see if the rumors are true that there maybe lake run rainbows in the stream.

The **fourth** trip is the bonus trip. We are planning a Steelhead fishing trip to eastern Ohio. Mentor, Ohio will be the base of operation for this trip. That will give access to the Ashtabula River, Conneaut Creek and the Grand, Chagrin and Rocky Rivers in the Cleveland Park System. This is a water level dependent trip. The steelhead move out of the Lake Erie on high water but high water is not always fishable so timing is everything.
