BUGS AND FLIES

Early Brown Stoneflies (EBS) are one of the earliest Eastern and Midwestern hatches. Beginning in early-to-mid March, after spending the past year hidden in the stream's bottom debris, the EBS reddish-brown nymphs migrate to the shoreline, crawl out of the water, and morph into adults.

Measuring from a half to three-quarters of an inch in length, adults sport dark,

grayish-brown colors that will vary from stream to stream. EBS adults have four highly veined wings that lie uniformly flat over their extended abdomen when at rest. They have six spider-like and conspicuously long antennae.


