Fishing Picks

Hope you managed to get out during the spring like weather we had after New Year's. That kind of weather isn't likely to hold up for long. Unfortunately, there were only limited opportunities for fishing. Norris Dam has had a steady run of generation but lake levels are starting to recede to the point where things might let up. Keep your eve on the schedule because the Clinch usually fishes well at this time of year. Miller's Island up to the dam are the best places to find big fish. Even if the water is running you might want to walk up Clear Creek and see the spawners. While it's closed to fishing it's always impressive to see such large fish in small water.

Things have been about the same on the South Holston and Watauga. There have been a few days with fishable schedules, but look for things to open up soon. The Watauga usually has better schedules for wading but hatches are better on the South Holston. The nastiest weather days always produce superb hatches of blue wing olives. I've spent plenty of cold, wet, and even snowy days catching fish on dries here in the winter. Water has remained high on the Hiwassee and promises to be for a while longer.

However, there are some days when the
Holston below Cherokee dam has
workable schedules. These days will
probably become more frequent in the
weeks to come.

The mountain streams have been the best bet. Water levels have been up and down with the rain but fishing has been decent for the dedicated angler. While there has been some surface activity, the best action has been on nymphs. Copper Johns, Tellico Nymphs, Prince Nymphs, Hare's Ears, and Pheasant Tails are all good choices. Little River and Middle Prong have been spotty but Abrams Creek seems to be fishing the best of all the Smoky Mountain streams right now. Tellico River and North River are also good at this time of year. If you're not up to braving the weather this is the best time to get those fly boxes filled.

This a killer fly when surging big trout in the Park hare and out west. always keep a few in your fly box.

Sizes: 4, 6, 8, 10

Hook Type: 3 X long nymph/streamer

Thread: Brown 6/0


Ribbing: Black chenille

Wing: Grizzly hackle, palmered through

body

Legs: Three white rubber legs sticking out each side, distributed evenly through body.
