Matt will talk in detail about Brook Trout restoration and what the future looks like for our favorite National



Park. Matt says, "I will cover the status of Lynn Camp Prong monitoring efforts, the brook trout distribution revisit study, brook trout metapopulation genetics the study on upper Little River, determining critical loads to protect the park from acid rain, fish and water project plans for 2016 and volunteer opportunities for 2016. I am looking forward to the meeting."

Water Sampling Meeting on Saturday, February 6, 2016 come to the meeting at Great Smoky Moountains National Park Headquarters to learn more about the Acid Deposition Sampling Program that began in 1993 to see how you can help in 2016!!

Why is the Program Important?

- Acid Deposition is a serious problem that has destroyed trout habitat in the Park.
- Because of our data, regional air emissions have significantly improved but the streams are still in current and long term danger.
- Measurements need to continue to monitor improvement and to better understand the plant, soil, geology, and stream interactions affecting improvements in the water.

• At the meeting we will provide up to date results and predictions, show the routes, conduct training, explain the sample teams, and get input for the schedule for the next year of sampling.

Trout in Classroom Groups Release Trout Parr in December

Elementary School Classes from three different schools participated in releasing into the Little River in Townsend the trout that they 'raised' and watched grow in their classroom as part of the Little River Chapter

sponsored Trout in the Classroom program. Approximately 125 students along with 10 – 12 teachers and aids participated in the release. As an added bonus a number of parents of students from each class attended; many parents reported on the enthusiasm with which the students became involved with the overall program and their excitement about the field trip to release their fish.

Three first grade classes from John Sevier Elementary School in Maryville did their release on

campground in Townsend. One of the classes, taught by Kim Fuchs with LRCTU member Steve Young as the TIC Coordinator, actually had the tank in their room, performed water chemistry, and fed the fish while 2 other classes on the same school 'team' helped with the release. As part of the day several other LRCTU members and GSMNP Staff help present other aspects of trout life and habitat; GSMNP Fisheries Technician Caleb Abramson started the program off by talking to the students about the river and its ecology, Rachell Wilhelm and Charlie Chmielewski pulled some nymphs from the water to show the students real trout food versus the powdered pellets the students fed the fish in the classroom. Ian and Charity Rutter were the release 'wardens' while Jim Jeswald and Steve Young compared the water chemistry of the river with that the children were monitoring in the tank in the classroom.

Later in the same day third graders from Townsend Elementary led by teacher Julia Ross and assisted by her TIC Coordinator Charity Rutter, released their fish. Ian Rutter, Rachell Wilhelm, Jim Jeswald, and Steve Young repeated their presentations to this group of students.

On Thursday of the same week – with even more rain - 4th graders from Porter Elementary School led by teacher Jennifer Childers along with volunteer coordinators Tim and Jama Hurst released their fish. As Bill Bollinger, our LRCTU TIC Coordinator for the school, said "neither fish nor fourth graders care about rain!".

Anyone present will witness to the success of our Trout in the Classroom program as reflected in the students' enthusiasm for learning about the fish and their growth as well as the other aspects of river ecology that is part of the program.

North Carolina Fly Tying Opportunity

Have you ever wanted to learn more about fishing the "other" side of the mountains? The Pisgah Chapter of Trout Unlimited is holding its annual Fly Fishing School on Saturday, April 23, 2016, from 8:30 am to 4:45 pm at Harmon Field in Tryon.

Students will receive not only a full day of practical instruction from experienced anglers covering the basics of fly fishing including equipment; casting; line management; and stream tactics; they will also get a 1/2 day session of "hands on" learning on one of the area's trout rich rivers or streams. The combination of the classroom instruction and on-the-water guided practice makes this one of the most unique and economical fly fishing schools available in our area.

The cost of the school (which includes lunch on Saturday, the 23rd) is \$150 for adults and \$100 for kids (ages 12 – 18). The price for a student of the 5 – Rivers Outreach Program is \$125. Equipment for the class will also be provided. Early Bird Special: \$25 off the price of the school if registration and payment are received before March 1, 2016.
