Trout Camp: Steve Young gave us an update on another very successful Trout Camp. Check out the Facebook page for additional information and some great pictures.

**Guest Speaker:** This months guest speaker was Michael HIcks from the TVA River Forecast Center. Mike came to give us a presentation on "The Whole Dam Story" - a broad perspective of the TVA River Scheduling system.

The TVA Watershed consists of 49 dams - 29 hydro power dams and 20 non power generating dams.

This watershed deals with an average of 51 inches of rainfall per year and 22 inches of runoff. Sixty percent of that rain occurs from January through April. The vegetation helps reduce the runoff in the summer months.

TVA was established in 1933. Their major focus areas are flood control, navigation, power generation, water supply, water quality, and recreation.

In the area of navigation and transportation, one barge operating on the river system = 15 railcars or 60 tractor trailer trucks. That obviously has a major positive impact on saving energy and reducing air pollution.

Flood Control consists of pre flood control procedures in preparation of a major event, control during the event and post event control. Weather forecasts help TVA develop

action plans which normally consists of holding water in tributary dam systems and then releasing that water over time.

Hydro Power: Nine percent of TVA's total power generation comes from hydro. That power comes from 3538 megawatts of conventional generation (109 units) and 1653 megawatts from pump storage and release capacity (4 units).

Water Supply: TVA operates 700 water intake units and services 4.5 million customers.

Recreation: Another important focus of TVA is the recreation area. This area focuses on boating, swimming, and fishing. It has a major financial impact of the local economy.

Reservoir Release Improvements: These activities which started in 1991 have lead to a significant improvement in tailwater health and fishing. Various aeration methods are used to infuse oxygen into the water as a part of the release process. This has led to a major improvement in water quality and fish populations.
