LRCTU Embrace-a-Stream Application Successful Once Again

Last fall, I (Gary Verholek) collaborated with Steve Moore and Matt Kulp to generate an Embrace-a-Stream (EAS) application entitled "Identification of Meta-Populations of Brook Trout in the Little River Watershed". So...what is a meta-population and why do we care? I'm so glad you asked. Before starting this application, I had no idea either; and it took some patience from Matt and Steve to educate me enough to complete the application. The gist of the application is as follows:

Recent genetic studies and observational evidence suggests that brook trout, transplanted with the intent of strengthening genetically diverse populations, have exhibited some selective (assortative) mating, or selectively mating with mostly their own stocked population in the upper tributaries. At the same time, some down-stream populations were found to be more genetically diverse due to connection between mainstem and tributary populations devoid of barriers, in contradiction to the assortative mating found in the upper tributaries. These genetically diverse, spatially separated populations, called "meta-populations" or "population of populations", can be expected to have a greater potential for long-term survival of the species. Meta-populations, or a larger watershed with a robust population, should have the greatest amount of genetic diversity and have the best chance to adapt to future stressors (such as climatic change) and persist over the long term.

Shortly, thanks to their patience with this author, GSMNP Fisheries will be receiving a <u>\$4800 grant</u> from TU to help them perform the study. By incorporating the results of this study into the GSMNP on-going restoration efforts, Steve and Matt expect to bolster the chances of long-term survival of the Brook Trout that LRCTU helps to transplant.

This is just one more way LRCTU supports GSMNP Fisheries. See you on the stream.

Never a Dull Moment on Hazel Creek

■an & Charity Rutter of R&R Fly Fishing, provided a wealth of information on fishing Hazel Creek,



one of the premiere rural free stone trout streams in the Eastern United States. The Rutters provided a history of the area from the time Ritter Lumber Company logged the area, giving life to the thriving logging community of Proctor to when TVA contributed to the remoteness of the area by building Fontana Dam.

Although there are a number of great trails that follow Hazel Creek as far up as Clingman's dome, and six miles of stream to fish, much of the best fishing lies at the lower elevations, close to where R&R pitches its tents for its annual Hazel Creek excursion, Charity said.

The best gear for Hazel, according to lan, is a 8-9 foot, 3-5 weight rod with standard variety of size 12-14 nymphs. "Spring is the best season. There are not too many people on the water, and excellent hatches," lan explained. And even when there are several folks fishing, it's easy to spread out, he said. How-To Notes:

Using Adobe® Reader® on a PC or Mac, turn on or off layers showing fish species color coded streams, facilities, waterfalls, etc. For example, you can hide all layers except for the waters holding only brook trout. Instructions are shown in lower left corner of the map. (Although the file can be viewed on an iPad, iPod or Android device, the all important "Layers" feature may not be available at the present time.)
