Fishing Picks

May probably has more good fishing in east Tennessee than any other month. Tailwater flows are generally great and the mountain streams are often at their peak. This has certainly been true this year.

Flows on the Clinch have been somewhat erratic with no reliable pattern of generation to count on. However, we have entered the season of recreation flows which usually provides schedules on the weekends which work out well of wading fishermen as well as floaters. Sulphur hatches have been relatively light compared with the glory days of old, but hatches are coming off. Probably the worst news for most anglers is that the best hatches seem to be during flows too high to wade. This is probably more a result of high flows in the afternoon most days rather than any planning on the part of mayflies. Try to get on the river late in the day when the hatches reach their peak.

The Hiwassee is currently on the spring time "pulse" schedule which provides superb wade fishing. About half a generator runs every three hours. The river remains fishable throughout the day with bursts of insect activity as the flow picks up. (Continued on page two) Fishing Picks: (Continued from page one) Caddis are the main hatch, but expect a smattering of varied bugs to show up. A variety of beadhead nymphs will fish well, but many anglers show up for the great dry fly fishing.

The worst part about fishing in the mountain streams right now is trying to pick one. All streams are fishing extremely well. Large streams like Little River and Tellico River are fishing. Now that the weather has warmed up the high elevation streams are also fishing well. Hatches of Light Cahills, sulphurs, and March Browns can be expected along with Yellow Sallies and a variety of caddis. You will likely find heavy hatches or spinner falls late in the evening that may cause fish to become selective. However you should probably focus on general patterns like Parachute Adams and Elk Caddis through the bulk of the day. Almost any pattern in a #14 should draw attention if presented properly.

Bambo for Brookies

A highlight of this year's TROUTFEST banquet will be a hand-planed, split bamboo fly rod with a hand sewn leather covered rod tube to be given as an end of festivities door prize.

The rod, made by Little River Chapter members Charlie Downs and Doug Pape, is a 6'9" 4 wt., 2 piece, 2 tip darkly flamed bamboo rod with black guides and blued nickel silver hardware – wraps are gossamer silk, deep orange, tipped in claret. – dipped gloss spar varnish completes this elegant rod.

The rod will be presented in a handsome hand sewn leather covered tube made by Little River Chapter member David Maxey.

The PlaningForm editor Ron Barch donated bamboo for the rod. Golden Witch Technologies donated the reel seat. All other components, including nickel silver ferrules, light wire guides, flor grade cork grip, Pearsall's silk thread, etc. were donated by local angler's, Little River Outfitters.

Fly of the Month Little Yellow Stonefly

Hook: TMC 100, sizes 12-16.
Thread: Yellow, 6/0.
Tail: Bright yellow deer or elk.
Butt: Fluorescent fire orange thread or Antron.
Rib: Fine gold wire.
Body: Yellow poly dubbing palmered with light dun or ginger hackle.
Wing: Bright yellow deer or elk tied downwing style and trimmed.
Hackle: Light dun or ginger.
