# Fishing Pick

October is well under way and it looks and feels like fall in the mountains. Color is very good in the high elevations and things are changing every day around Elkmont, Tremont, and Cades Cove. Overnight temperatures are routinely in the 40's while daytime highs are in the high 60's and might reach 70.

Dry fly fishing remains good in the mountain streams but you'll need to downsize your fly. Fish aren't looking at much that's larger than a #16 and #18's and even #20's might do better if you've got a pod of rising fish spotted. Parachute patterns like an Adams and Blue Wing Olive have been my staple, but searching the riffles and pockets with a similar size Elk Caddis or Stimulator can be productive as well. Beadheads in #16 are the best nymphs right now. Afternoons are fishing best, particularly after a cold night.

Everyone is asking about brown trout right now. They're definitely out eating as they prepare for the spawn. We've seen a few fish paired up, but not over gravel. Things usually get pretty interesting by the end of the month and are rolling in early November.

Tailwater fishing remains a viable option this fall. Recreational releases on the Clinch have guaranteed that water will remain off until 10 AM on Saturdays and we've seen some Sundays when it was off all day. The South Holston and Watauga currently have the most reliable wade schedules at almost any time of the week. While fishing is tough on the Clinch right now, the South Holston is seeing good olive hatches. If you've got a day to spend fishing, I'd recommend that you watch the extended weather outlook and try to find a drizzly day when the water is off. Dry fly fishing should be superb. The Watauga remains a good, reliable place to find a few willing fish. The Hiwassee is high and pretty tough for anyone without a boat.

# PROJECT FISH GATLINBURG

On Wednesday the 13th of October David Ray and Tom Eustis met with Matt Kulp and Judy Dulin, who is with the Pi Beta Phi Elementary School in Gatlinburg. The purpose was to plan the details for "Project Fish Gatlinburg". Judy Dulin applied for and received a grant to introduce 8th and 9th grade students to the wonderful world of fishing. The grant covered the cost of many things but what is needed are some volunteers from TU. Besides the National Partners there are 6 local Partners including LRCTU, GSMNP, Smoky Mountain Angler, TWRA, TN Environmental Education Assoc. and Pi Beta Phi school.


**Adams Wulff**

Body: Gray fur.

**Wing:** White calf tail, upright and divided. **Hackle:** Mixed brown and grizzly; heavy.





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
